This talk includes some of Louis' hit recordings as he rose to international stardom.

Chris took up playing clarinet at school and has had a successful and varied career as a professional musician in London and Hampshire. More recently, he produced a series of music and information-based jazz programmes for BBC Local radio all across the South.

Christmas – A Festive History

In an uplifting presentation, **Andy Thomas** uncovers the long and intriguing background to the festive season. From the ancient celebration of light in the winter darkness, to the marking of the birth of a messiah, Andy shows how we can still find meaning in Christmas today.

Andy is the author of *Christmas – From Solstice to Santa*. He is also author of several books on unexplained mysteries and conspiracies, as well as guides to Sussex history and folklore (including the Lewes Bonfire Night traditions) and is a keen celebrator of the festive season. Andy widely writes and lectures and has made numerous radio and TV appearances.

Pick up

Unless otherwise stated, pick up is from the lay by/bus stop outside Frogmore Campus, on the Reading Road. Please park in the top car park, next to the courts, as arranged with the campus. Only Blue Badge holders may park in the bottom car park adjacent to the road.

Payment

Because of the change to Internet banking, we will no longer be collecting deposits for each outing. Instead, please pay the full amount, via Internet banking, to the Outings account as detailed on page 2 of the newsletter. Use the name of the outing as the reference. Payment can be made at any time up to the 1st day of the month of the outing, but obviously your place is not reserved until payment has been received. We therefore suggest early payment to secure a place, but please give your name to us before payment to ensure there is availability on the trip.

Feedback and suggestions please

The number of people joining us on the monthly outings has decreased this year and the coach hire price has naturally increased, owing to fuel costs. These two factors mean we will have to increase the cost of each outing slightly. As the coach cost is fixed, and there is little price difference between the different sized coaches, the more people on the coach, the cheaper it is for everyone. But we would like to know if the drop in numbers is due to the price of the outings, the choice and venue of the outings, or is it simply the general increase in cost of living making people more careful with their money? We would also like to hear from you as to the type of outings you would like to go on. Bear in mind that it must appeal to a lot of people and not be too specialised. Some places suggested are only half day trips, but as there is little difference in the coach cost for half-day versus whole-day hire, we like to get value for money and go to two venues close together. Some places also offer lunches at reduced price for groups, but this increases the overall cost of the outing, and some people prefer just a snack at lunch time, thereby costing less. So currently, I don't usually book a group lunch.

We often compare our costs with those organised by the coach companies, but have discovered that some of these trips appear cheaper as they do not include the entrance costs. They take you to a town and let you decide what you do once there. So please email us with any thought, suggestions or comments. Thank you!



Third Age Trust AGM 2022 – Follow-up

Please see the following note advising us of the outcome of the voting which took place at the TAT's AGM in October. – *Jill Sims, Secretary*

Dear members,

At a meeting held immediately after the Annual General Meeting held on 6th October, the Board of Trustees reviewed the outcome and implications of the main proceedings.

The Board recognised that almost 50% of u3as took an active part in the AGM, demonstrating a higher level of engagement than at any other AGM in memory, and that must be positive in a democratic organisation.

However, there was some disappointment that none of the amendments or resolutions associated with membership subscription were successful. In effect, this means that at this stage for 2023/24 and 2024/25, the Trust will remain under funded.

The Board is preparing revised financial forecasts and an action plan. We recognise the need for open discussion with the membership in order to ensure that we hear the concerns, views and aspirations of the u3a membership.

More details of discussion opportunities will come in committee mailings over the next few months. Please share this with your committees and members as appropriate.
